RUBIO & MURPHY HEADED TOWARD COMPETITIVE GENERAL ELECTION RACE

Republican Marco Rubio and Democrat Patrick Murphy hold commanding leads in their respective primary races and currently appear to be locked in a tight general election race for Florida's U.S. Senate seat.

On the Republican side, Rubio holds a wide 61%-22% lead over his strongest primary challenger Carlos Beruff. Likewise, Murphy leads his leading Democratic primary opponent Alan Grayson by 55%-22%.

Looking ahead to November, Rubio has a narrow 46%-43% advantage over Murphy among likely general election voters. Rubio leads among Republicans (80%-9%) and Independents (47%-40%), while Murphy is ahead among Democrats (76%-15%).

Rubio also leads among white voters (53%-36%) and Hispanics (49%-41%), while Murphy has a wide advantage among African-Americans (79%-12%).

Men favor Rubio by 50%-38%, while women back Murphy 47%-43%.

Rubio runs strong in North Florida (51%-39%) and Southwest Florida (52%-38%) and has smaller leads in Central Florida (49%-44%) and Tampa Bay (45%-39%). Murphy has the edge in Southeast Florida (50%-39%).

HOW THE POLL WAS CONDUCTED

This poll was conducted by Mason-Dixon Polling & Research, Inc. of Jacksonville, Florida from August 22 through August 24, 2016. A total of 625 registered Florida voters were interviewed statewide by telephone. All indicated they were likely to vote in the November general election.

Those interviewed on land-lines were selected by the random variation of the last four digits of telephone numbers. A cross-section of exchanges was utilized in order to ensure an accurate reflection of the state. Those interviewed on cell phones were selected from a list of working cell phone numbers. Quotas were assigned to reflect voter turnout by county.

The margin for error, according to standards customarily used by statisticians, is no more than ± 4 percentage points. This means that there is a 95 percent probability that the "true" figure would fall within that range if all voters were surveyed. The margin for error is higher for any subgroup, such as a gender or age grouping.

This section of the survey also includes and over-sampling of 400 likely Democratic primary voters and 400 likely Republican primary voters. This over-sampling was only done on the questions that relate to the Florida Senate primary. The margin for error among each primary sample is ± 5 percentage points.
